2.1 Environmental Justice Assessment

This Environmental Justice Assessment and Community Engagement Plan (EJ Assessment) provides an overview of the Environmental Justice communities and considerations in or near the proposed South Texas Sequestration Project (Kleberg Hub). The proposed CO₂ Sequestration Project includes the permitting and installation of six UIC Class VI wells and supporting injection facilities. This Environmental Justice Assessment follows the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) guidance dated August 2023, *Environmental Justice Guidance for UIC Class VI Permitting and Primacy*, including the direction to utilize the Area of Review (AoR) for environmental justice assessment. The Kleberg Hub AoR was determined to be within Kleberg County, Texas (2020)

More specifically, the Kleberg Hub AoR is completely within the King Ranch property boundary, which is located approximately 20 miles east of Kingsville, Texas. The land area of Kleberg County is 881.3 square miles, and it is the 169th largest county in Texas by area.

This EJ Assessment evaluated Census Tract 48273020101 (Census Tract), which completely encompasses the Kleberg Hub AoR (see Figure EJ-1). The Census Tract covers an area of 519.2 square miles with a population of 3,130 people, according to the 2020 Decennial Census. The Kleberg Hub and the associated AoR are in a rural area. 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

An analysis of communities in proximity to the Kleberg Hub was conducted using the following screening tools:

- Department of Energy's Energy Justice Dashboard tool (DOE EJ Dashboard).
- The Climate and Economic Justice Screening Tool (CEJST).

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- The Environmental Protection Agency's Environmental Justice Screening and Mapping tool (EJScreen).
- The Department of Agriculture Food Access Research Atlas Map (FARA).

This EJ assessment was conducted as a desktop review and is not a final, definitive analysis. The potential impacts to surrounding communities will continue to be evaluated as 1PointFive pursues community engagement activities.

Because the Kleberg Hub AoR is entirely encompassed in Census Tract 48273020101, this EJ Assessment focuses on the communities located within that census tract. However, the Community Engagement Plan expands beyond the Census Tract to include potential impacts to surrounding communities. This EJ Assessment anticipates minimal direct impacts to surrounding communities.

The detailed results of the desktop EJ Assessment review can be found attached in Appendix A. This EJ Assessment identifies project benefits in Section 2.2 and project impacts and mitigation strategies in Section 2.3.

2.2.1 Results of the DOE EJ Dashboard

Although the DOE EJ Dashboard does not provide census-tract specific data, 1PointFive's analysis determined the impacted area is not considered disadvantaged. The dashboard indicates the area of the proposed location has a high degree of "All Particulate Matter," among the 80th percentile in the US, a high minority population (80th percentile), a high proportion of population considered low-income (80th percentile), and close proximity to water discharge sites (100th percentile).

2.2.2 Results of the CEJST

The CEJST tool, which uses census tract divisions from the 2010 census, is based on Census Tract 48273020100, which is the applicable census tract available in that tool. The Census Tract otherwise used for this EJ assessment (48273020101) is based on the tract divisions used during the 2020 census and located within Census Tract 48273020100 from 2010. This tool indicates that Census Tract 48273020100 is disadvantaged in the areas of climate change and legacy pollution, due to a high expected population loss rate, high projected flood risk, proximity to a formerly used defense site, and a high poverty level; therefore, the Census Tract may be considered disadvantaged. The Census Tract also has relatively high indicators for diabetes and particulate matter (PM2.5), though not high enough to be deemed disadvantaged using these parameters.

2.2.3 Results of EJScreen

EJScreen showed elevated levels of particulate matter in the Census Tract containing the AoR. It also showed high rates of less than high school education (85th percentile), limited English-speaking households, and a high supplemental demographic index (89th percentile). In addition, the tract has a high rate of drinking water noncompliance (98th percentile).

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2.2.4 Results of the DOA FARA

The Food Access Resource Atlas Map found the Census Tract has a low number of households more than one-half mile from a supermarket, indicating higher access to food. This Census Tract is identified as “Low Access at 1 and 10 miles”, meaning at least 500 people or 33% of the population live farther than 1 mile (urban) or 10 miles (rural) from the nearest supermarket.

2.2 Assessment of Project Benefits

As the applicant for the Kleberg Hub, 1PointFive is dedicated to advancing leading-edge carbon management technologies and projects, including Direct Air Capture (DAC) through its parent company OLCV, point-source carbon capture, and geological storage of CO₂. Pursuing the permitting and the installation of the Kleberg Hub allows 1PointFive to be part of the solution to reduce climate-related impacts on EJ communities. Employing DAC technologies along with the Kleberg Hub will provide significant benefits to local communities such as job creation, workforce development programs, local tax revenue, and investments in local communities.

Additionally, carbon management projects will allow local businesses and organizations to diversify their portfolios. Carbon management projects can benefit local communities by providing well-paying and stable jobs. Local businesses and organizations will be able to participate in the clean energy transition as well.

Except as specifically identified in this EJ Assessment, community benefits and engagements may be shared across 1PointFive's DAC and Kleberg Hub projects. The Kleberg Hub and DAC projects are functionally interrelated and share community engagement resources.

2.3 Assessment of Project Impacts

The area surrounding the Kleberg Hub is sparsely populated; therefore, drilling and well construction are anticipated to have minimal potential negative impacts for residents. The impacts will be minimized and mitigated through 1PointFive's robust suite of best management practices. After construction is completed, operational impacts are also expected to be minimal for residents.

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The Kleberg Hub facilities will have sophisticated real time monitoring systems to allow operators to rapidly detect and respond to any changes in well conditions before they could create a risk to human health or the environment.

1PointFive will further quantify and implement mitigation measures to minimize potential disproportionate negative impacts from the project on the EJ communities. The Community Engagement Plan (Section 2.4, below) details 1PointFive's standard practice, which is to collaborate with communities to avoid, minimize, and mitigate the impacts to the surrounding environment and bring benefits to the community. The unique characteristics of the communities are taken into account in community engagement, educational, and workforce development initiatives associated with the project to limit any potential negative impacts and contribute positive benefits to the community. Table EJ-2 highlights the anticipated project impacts to the community.

2.4 Community Engagement Plan: Kleberg Hub

This document provides an overview of the project's identified stakeholders, outreach to date, community outreach plan, and potential benefits for the community. The Kleberg Hub is situated on a remote site in the Laureles Division of the 825,000-acre King Ranch, in rural northeast Kleberg County. Construction and operations of the Kleberg Hub will impact the host and surrounding communities in the Coastal Bend Region. Those who live and work on King Ranch (approximately 66 individuals), and individuals who live adjacent to the King Ranch and along the haul route (hereafter Zone 1) will be the most directly impacted. The next most directly impacted will be Kleberg and Nueces Counties (approximately 384,218 individuals) (Zone 2). The regional reach of the development will impact the eleven Coastal Bend Counties (approximately 1.5 million individuals) (Zone 3).

2.4.1 Completed Outreach and Feedback

1PointFive takes an integrated approach to public engagement that includes a Stakeholder Relations Team (SRT) for those who live near the project, engagement with local officials and organizations, and direct community investment through local partnerships, volunteer efforts, and charitable giving. The SRT is a dedicated resource for the communities near 1PointFive's proposed projects, developments and ongoing operations. In their commitment to being a good neighbor, the SRT provides frequent and transparent information, answers questions, and seeks community feedback. This information helps 1PointFive to identify and mitigate negative impacts and improve benefits to impacted communities via active listening and two-way dialogue.

In the initial meetings, the team listened to concerns and ideas and solicited feedback to better understand the issues important to the community. Interactions with community members also helped identify the community's priorities, which are focused on creating well-paying jobs, protecting wildlife, and supporting environmental conservation.

1PointFive has initiated a comprehensive community and workforce engagement plan, led by its Community Engagement Team (CET), to understand community priorities and potential barriers

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for full participation in the workforce for the Kleberg Hub. The goal is to create opportunities for inclusive development that addresses community needs and strengthens local economies.

Since November 2022, members of the CET have conducted more than 35 in-person meetings with key stakeholders within 50 miles of the Kleberg Hub's location, including community-based organizations, labor organizations, environmental advocacy organizations, and academic institutions. Additionally, meetings have been held with leaders of organizations that represent disadvantaged and underrepresented communities, including leaders from St. Paul AME Church, Douglass Youth Center, Kingsville Boys and Girl's Club, and Communities in Schools. Initial engagement has resulted in support from the nearly 150 community members and leaders that the project team has met with to date. Letters of support are available upon request and a description of involvement from community stakeholders is provided with this application.

The CET began initial engagement with [REDACTED], to explain the project, solicit feedback on concerns, and better understand how to best engage with the community. Given their proximity to the project, residents of [REDACTED] will be the most impacted by the Kleberg Hub. 1PointFive has held discussions with local environmental advocacy groups to better understand environmental issues and concerns that may be relevant to the project. Outreach sessions have also been held with representatives from the Coastal Bend Bays and Estuaries Program (CBBEP), the Baffin Bay Stakeholder Group, the Coastal Bend Air Quality Partnership (CBAQP), and the Caesar Kleberg Wildlife Research Institute out of Texas A&M University-Kingsville (TAMUK).

Beginning in February 2023, the SRT started communicating with stakeholders about the proposed project and continued identifying the community's interests, challenges, opportunities, and values concerning the proposed project from these meetings. So far, the SRT has met with more than 350 stakeholders. 1PointFive also has a website with information on DAC, carbon sequestration, project information, and community at SouthTexas1PointFive.com for stakeholders to utilize. There have been multiple requests from stakeholders for direct feedback opportunities, with the most successful conversations occurring during community meetings and Kleberg County events. Table EJ-13below is a summary of each engagement type and approximate timing.

The CET has met several times with local and county level officials, chambers of commerce, and educators. Representatives of these organizations have expressed interest in participating in the project through partnership or involvement with the Community Advisory Board (CAB) to be established. By establishing the CAB, 1PointFive plans to foster continuous, ongoing dialogue with the community regarding issues of mutual concern.

This early engagement has resulted in partnerships with several organizations to address community priorities, such as local training and environmental conservation. For example, 1PointFive is working directly with local colleges and universities to expand existing technical programs for the inclusion of DAC-specific curriculum.

1PointFive has used multiple processes to identify stakeholders relevant to the Kleberg Hub. The CET began with the King Ranch family, which has been a part of the community since 1853 and is knowledgeable of the region's history, social cohesion, and the challenges it faces. From there, outreach expanded to local elected officials. Other key stakeholders were also identified by community leaders during outreach meetings. These include schools, churches, and organizations focused on conservation, environmental protection, and workforce development. In addition, 1PointFive has conducted stakeholder identification, analysis and mapping using an internal database and Geographic Information System (GIS) system, from which nearly 150 households were identified. From this analysis, the team identified and prioritized key stakeholders within the areas most impacted by the Kleberg Hub, Zones 1 and 2.

- **Community Stakeholders** include King Ranch onsite employees, nearby residents, Douglass Youth Center in Kingsville, St. Paul AME Church, Coastal Bend

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Communities in School Program, Corpus Christi Local Emergency Planning Committee, Kingsville Chamber of Commerce, and United Corpus Christi Chamber of Commerce.

- **Environmental Advocacy and Conservation Stakeholders** include the Baffin Bay Stakeholder Group, the CBAQP and the CBBEP. These stakeholders have been engaged to build connections and engage in dialogue with communities around conservation and to support citizen science and community outreach programs. Engagement also includes funding for environmental research.
- **Workforce Development Stakeholders** include Workforce Solutions Coastal Bend, Del Mar College, TAMUK and Prairie View A&M University (PVAMU). Engagement includes partnerships and funding to develop DAC-related curriculum and related skills training and scholarships and establishing continuing education programs.
- **Government and Elected Officials Stakeholders** include Kleberg and Nueces County Commissioners, Kleberg County Sheriff, and city mayors of Kingsville, Driscoll, Petrolina, and Corpus Christi. Engagement includes participating in local governance meetings and community activities to engage in dialogue with decision makers around feedback received from communities and how this feedback is incorporated into the project.

All stakeholders and community members listed above are active public participants. Additionally, all stakeholders and community members are encouraged to participate in the application process for the CAB. Several key stakeholders have already expressed interest in being part of the CAB and a notice has been posted to the stakeholder website with additional information.

From initial stakeholder engagement, the CET learned that a key community concern is truck traffic near [REDACTED]. This will be mitigated by notifying [REDACTED] ahead of planned rig movements and requiring that all drivers follow best management practices to avoid and minimize impacts. 1PointFive has obtained property for an access gate so construction and other activities can be isolated from [REDACTED].

1PointFive will continue to identify and engage stakeholders, including disadvantaged communities and other underrepresented groups, as the Kleberg Hub Project advances.

When considering locating the project, 1PointFive took a consent-based siting approach with the King Ranch by appropriately integrating the project with existing landscapes and operations. This approach resulted in adjusting the project site location.

Based on initial engagement, 1PointFive has started to address community concerns raised in early discussions. For example, during initial engagements, the CET heard concerns about potential impacts to groundwater associated with CO₂ injection. In response, 1PointFive has proposed partnerships with the University of Texas Gulf Coast Carbon Center (UTGCC), TAMUK, and the Livermore Lab Foundation (LLF) to lead engagement and education around CO₂ storage. Community engagement efforts will focus on communities with traditionally limited access to science education. UTGCC will present hands-on demonstrations and community activities to

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give stakeholders a sense of ownership in the Kleberg Hub as well as an understanding of the science of geologic storage. 1PointFive will also test groundwater both pre- and post-injection. The monitoring data will be available to the public in accordance with 1PointFive's Data Management Plan. In addition, the Project will include substantial technical and operational safeguards to protect underground sources of drinking water (USDW) and human health and the environment.

Through initial engagement, 1PointFive also learned that water use, conservation, and safety are key challenges facing the Coastal Bend region. 1PointFive is pursuing a partnership with the CBBEP, a local nonprofit dedicated to protecting the bays, estuaries, and local watersheds to address preexisting concerns about the health of waters in the region. This partnership involves creating a conservation fund to address water quality issues in Baffin Bay and other local watersheds.

Other engagement efforts by 1PointFive based on dialogue with communities include:

- Executing agreements with Kleberg County and Riviera ISD to promote a flow of benefits back to the impacted communities by incentivizing 1PointFive to create local jobs through construction and operations (completed October 2024).
- Evaluating a potential transportation program for local communities.
- Promoting apprenticeship programs focused on disadvantaged communities to develop a future pool of skilled local workers.
- Continuing engagement with workforce organizations and academic institutions at all levels.
- Developing a partnership with PVAMU to increase the number of graduates with STEM degrees.
- Proposing funding for graduate assistants at TAMUK to monitor potential impacts from the Kleberg Hub, developing a conservation and restoration strategy for the Coastal Bend region, integrating DAC technology into engineering curriculum, and facilitating outreach and educational programs.
- Accelerating the improvement of internet infrastructure to benefit residents of [REDACTED] [REDACTED], who currently do not have access to reliable, high-speed internet.
- Working its proposed partners, such as UTGCC and Lawrence Livermore National Lab (LLNL), to provide independent monitoring and reporting to verify that engagement efforts are achieving the objectives and desired outcomes.

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2.4.3 Community Outreach Plan

1PointFive's engagement methods are designed to increase its learning around community interests and concerns, seek input from community members, and respond to concerns as they arise. This includes efforts to respond to emerging public safety concerns regarding CO₂ storage and extending outreach methods to include traditionally excluded stakeholders in developing the project.

1PointFive is working with the Livermore Lab Foundation (LLF), which has proposed developing a series of qualitative and quantitative community engagement surveys. Results from the surveys could help set the context for community benefit discussions and agreements and provide the project with peer-reviewed data and analysis that can serve as a benchmark for future engagement(s).

Engagement methods also include face-to-face and video meetings in the local communities. Other planned engagement methods may also include:

- Presentations to stakeholder groups.
- Hosting focus groups and listening sessions to gain greater insight into the experiences and perspectives of different stakeholders.
- Participating in community activities and meetings.
- Establishing and publicizing project information, offering a toll-free contact number and email address, media releases, and a project-specific website.

All communication tools, meetings, and materials are written and conducted in multiple languages, including Spanish. 1PointFive hopes to increase and broaden the participation of stakeholders in the Kleberg Hub with these methods.

In addition, a CAB is being established to foster dialogue with the community regarding issues of mutual concern. The CAB will consist of diverse community members representing the Coastal Bend Region (Zone 3) and will be selected through an online application process. The process for constituting the CAB will be transparent. The CET will seek input from all stakeholders to ensure the board is representative of the community. The CAB will provide insight, guidance, and advice on outreach initiatives, project development, workforce programs, and other matters of interest to the committee.

Over the next 15 months, 1PointFive plans the following community engagement activities:

- K-12 outreach in schools within Zone 2 & 3 focused on disadvantaged communities with UTGCC.

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- Listening sessions with community members in Zones 1 and 2.
- Critical Stakeholder Outreach — one-on-one and small group meetings with community members, community-based organizations, and key stakeholders in Zones 1, 2, 3.
- Establishment of Community Advisory Board.
- Meetings to solidify the Community Benefit Agreement Outreach and Engagement with Community College and University Partners regarding work-force development and program implementation.
- Outreach and engagement with subrecipients regarding program execution.
- Analysis of community feedback and input to adjust engagement strategies moving forward.
- Development of mitigation measures in conjunction with community organizations and adjustment of operational plans to mitigate or minimize potential negative impacts.
- Establishment of community-based science and monitoring programs in partnership with UTGCC.
- Implementation of community-based science and monitoring programs in partnership with UTGCC.

Following these activities, the CET will continue to meet with the CAB quarterly and tailor meetings to stakeholders' capacity and interest to continue.

Important considerations to this outreach include:

- Ensuring listening sessions are offered in person at a location convenient for stakeholder groups, with translation available.
- Ensuring listening sessions are offered virtually to accommodate nontraditional working hours and other limitations, with translation.
- Sharing information about listening sessions and opportunities for engagement through numerous communication channels to reach a broader audience and promote accessibility.
- Ensuring information is provided at an accessible reading level.
- Maintaining outreach throughout planning, construction, and early operational phases.
- Providing multiple accessible communication channels.
- Recruiting members to the CAB that represent the affected community.

1PointFive's CET will incorporate feedback to ensure that stakeholder perspectives are considered, including post-event surveys. These surveys will be distributed immediately following events and will be designed to answer specific questions about the project.

For stakeholders within Zone 1, 1PointFive will use focused communication tools designed to seek additional feedback as the project progresses. Multilingual communication tools include mailed notices, toll free telephone number, email address, and a website to share information on the project development and operations. Throughout the construction phase, door canvassing, and one-on-one

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meetings will be used. Additionally, the CET will seek feedback from the CAB, who will also provide insights and recommendations for improvement.

To track feedback over time, the team will compile and analyze data from the surveys and meetings and use this information to identify trends and community concerns. Additionally, the team will track progress by comparing feedback from one event to another to track changes and adjustments that have been made. 1PointFive will work with its proposed partners, such as Lawrence Livermore Foundation (LLF), to provide independent monitoring of community benefits and report the findings.

To answer questions, the team will be available during daytime and evening hours via the 1PointFive Response Line and email. Interpretation services will be available, as needed, for all community events.

The SRT will consider all reasonable mitigation measures proposed to avoid, minimize, and mitigate potential adverse impacts for community members.

Guided by prior and ongoing stakeholder interaction, the proposed engagement timeline for the Kleberg Hub project is listed in Table EJ-4. This timeline is subject to change as it depends on the desires and input from the community, the project phase, external impacts, and more.

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SRT Support Throughout Permitting:

The SRT will interact with the local communities, residents, resident groups, and churches through door-to-door visits, mailings, emails, websites, and one-on-one and community meetings. They will proactively provide stakeholders with the following information:

- A description and map of the physical siting of the proposed location.
- A description, proposed timeline, and expected duration of different operations, including facility construction, drilling, production, and reclamation.
- The types of equipment, and other on- and off-location infrastructure related to planned operations.
- A description of each stage of operations and 1PointFive's best management practices to avoid, minimize, and mitigate potential impacts, including noise, light, odor, dust, traffic, and visual.
- Contact information for the 1PointFive SRT.
- An offer to meet with individuals and groups with additional questions about the project.

Before and after the commencement of construction and operations, the SRT will:

- Continue to engage with stakeholders to provide development updates and to answer questions or discuss concerns.
- Frequently send courtesy notices to interested stakeholders to ensure they have the most up-to-date information about operations.
- Continue to update the SouthTexas1PointFive.com website with project information.
- Manage the 1PointFive Stakeholder Response Line to hear and mitigate localized challenges as they arise. This can include responding to grievances such as mud, light, noise, and more, for which the SRT will be responsible for coordinating with internal teams to rectify.
- Continue to be available to assist the community throughout the project's lifecycle, at 866.248.9051 or Stakeholder@1PointFive.com Monday through Friday.

2.4.4 Community Benefits

During the course of the Project, 1PointFive's DAC facility and the Kleberg Hub are expected to create approximately 1,800 jobs in construction, operations, and maintenance. An agreement between Kleberg County and Riviera ISD has been executed that incentivizes 1PointFive to hire locally for the workforce needed for construction and operations of the DAC Facility, providing a mechanism for benefits to stay within local communities.

Examples of Completed Community Engagements with communities near the project include:

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- **Barbara Bush Houston Literacy Foundation**
 - 1PointFive partnered with the Barbara Bush Houston Literacy Foundation to sponsor the Nueces County Libraries' 2023 Summer Reading Program and the 2023-2024 Nueces StoryWalk®, unveiled at a ribbon cutting hosted by the Nueces County Library at Ortiz Park in Robstown.
 - With the Kleberg Public Library, 1PointFive sponsored technology programs for after-school tutoring as well as a partnership with the Family Place Library™ program implementation.
 - With Corpus Christi Library System, 1PointFive sponsored the implementation of the Family Place Library™ program.
- **Boys & Girls Club of Kingsville:** 1PointFive donated towards creating and providing a new STEM education computer lab and curriculum.
- **Kleberg County State of the County:** As a cosponsor of the 2023 State of the County meeting, hosted by the Kingsville Chamber of Commerce and Kleberg County Judge, 1PointFive established a commitment in support of Kleberg County, its businesses and residents.
- **Gulf of Mexico Alliance:** The Gulf of Mexico Alliance Gulf Star program provides funding for projects that support healthy beaches, clean waters, productive ecosystems, and thriving coastal communities. All projects in the Gulf Star Program accomplish actions identified by the Alliance's Priority Issue Teams and Cross-Team Initiatives in the Governors' Action Plan for Healthy and Resilient Coasts. 1PointFive's funding will allow funding focusing on green design to increase the ability of the Gulf Coast communities to improve their resilience and reduce water pollution by adopting innovative practices.
- **Texas A&M University Kingsville:** As 1PointFive recognizes the importance of education of its projects, it also recognizes the value of enabling students of the communities that it serves. 1PointFive attended the Fall 2023 Career Fair and spoke to students about the DAC project as well as career opportunities that may be offered.
 - **Baffin Bay Stakeholder Group:** 1PointFive was in attendance and presented the Kleberg Hub project at the Annual Baffin Bay Stakeholder Group meeting. The Stakeholder Group is currently led and facilitated by representatives from the Coastal Bend Bays & Estuaries Program (CBBEP) and the Harte Research Institute for Gulf of Mexico Studies (HRI), and includes researchers, commercial and recreational fishers, landowners, ranchers, business owners, representatives from state and local agencies, conservation organizations, and other interested stakeholders. The Stakeholder Group collaborated with state officials to create a science-based Watershed Protection Plan (WPP), which was reviewed and accepted by the U.S Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in March 2023. The WPP outlines a strategy to implement management measures that will reduce nonpoint source pollution into the watershed and, ultimately, Baffin Bay. The Baffin Bay Stakeholder Group continues to be involved in implementing the WPP through restoration, outreach, and education efforts in the Bay and watershed.

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Examples of upcoming and potential community engagements:

- **Wish For Wheels:** 1PointFive will be partnering with Wish for Wheels and the King Ranch for a volunteer opportunity to provide 300 bikes to students of Kleberg ISD.
- **Ranch Hand Weekend:** In November 2023, 1PointFive sponsored the City of Kingsville's annual Ranch Hand Weekend, a yearly community event that celebrates the ranching community in Kleberg County. Additionally, during this event, 1PointFive volunteers were given the opportunity to serve the Kleberg community at the annual Ranch Hand Breakfast hosted by King Ranch.
- **Kingsville Chamber of Commerce:** As an Executive Level member of the Kingsville Chamber, 1PointFive serves on the Chamber Board of Directors. The board meetings take place once a month, and allow 1PointFive representation to share project updates, build relationships, and solicit feedback.

1PointFive has identified a wide range of organizations with which to explore partnerships for workforce development, education, and community benefits. The benefits of the Kleberg Hub are designed to align with community priorities. Community members have expressed the desire for jobs to stay in the local community. The job creation and workforce development benefits align with 1PointFive's intention to hire from local communities, wherever possible, and set up or bolster workforce development programs at local academic institutions. Additionally, the lack of high-speed internet access was brought up as an issue during town halls. 1PointFive will have robust internet and a 5G network at the Kleberg Hub, so the local internet infrastructure will be improved. Anticipated benefits include:

- Job creation for the local workforce, especially those who are unemployed or underemployed; job creation benefits local businesses as well due to increased consumer spending.
- Tax revenue for Kleberg County residents, Texas residents, and the Riviera ISD.
- Workforce development for underrepresented students in STEM at UTGCC, PVAMU, TAMUK, Del Mar College, fossil fuel workers transitioning to clean energy industry, and participants in certification programs.
- Building community and local academic carbon management capacity.
- Increased clean energy enterprise creation and contracting.
- Alternative and public transportation infrastructure investment.
- Grassland restoration and enhanced range management; improvement of wildlife habitat.
- Increased high-speed internet infrastructure.

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Appendix A

A.1 Environmental Justice Screening: Kleberg Hub

Overview: The raw data below is accurate as of October 2024, when the analysis was completed. The screening tools were used to evaluate the Census Tract that contains the Kleberg Hub and the associated AoR.

The DOE EJ Dashboard shows elevated levels of particulate matter, among the top 100th percentile in the US, and a high minority population at the proposed site. The EPA EJSscreen indicates the communities near the proposed project may be subject to similarly elevated levels of particulate matter as well as toxic wastewater discharge. The communities also have an above-average rate of non-high school attainment. The CEJST tool finds the community to be disadvantaged in the areas of climate change and legacy pollution, thanks to a high expected population loss rate, proximity to a formerly used defense site, and high poverty level. The Food Access Resources Atlas indicates the area has a relatively high number of households with access to a supermarket, and a low share of people living in group quarters.
